Identity Theft & Fraud Prevention to be Topic at Open House–Community Night Program Friday, March 9th

The Grange's annual Open House Community Night Fellowship Dinner is a perfect way to kick off spring. Invite your friends and neighbors to join us for the evening that begins with a fellowship dinner at 6:30 p.m. in the Millerstown Community Park Building, 110 West Juniata Parkway, Millerstown. The Grange will provide meat, beverage, table cover and place settings; please bring a favorite casserole, salad or dessert to share.

The public is invited to attend this annual Open House Community Night event beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the Millerstown Community Park Building, 100 West Juniata Parkway. Meat, beverage and place settings will be provided; persons attending are invited to bring a favorite casserole, salad or dessert to share.

Retired Police Detective and Special Agent Mark Brumaghim will discuss "Identity Theft and Fraud Prevention" during the evening's program. Officer Brumaghim will discuss Identity theft and credit card fraud as defined by Pennsylvania law. The program covers how identity thieves can access an individual's confidential data and will explain safeguard methods to protect one's identity and credit card information. He will also review different types of contractor and internet scams. Mr.Brumaghim was employed by the Lower Paxton Township Police Department from 1988 until 2014, spending the last 10 years of his police career investigating financial crimes such as credit card fraud, identity theft and embezzlement. Upon his retirement from the police force, Mark worked for the

Pennsylvania Office of Attorney General as a Special Agent in the Medicaid Fraud Section where he conducted criminal investigations into neglect of care-dependent persons living in long term care facilities until his recent retirement.

Also included on the evening's program will be the presentation of \$3,585 to the Perry County Food Bank, representing proceeds of the recent Hunger Banquet co-sponsored by the Grange and Greenwood FFA. Another feature of the program will be the introduction of 2017 Business Sponsors and the presentation of certificates to these local businesses that support the Grange.

Emergency Services Program & Community Citizen Award Friday, April 13th

Two important topics will be featured at this month's regular Grange meeting beginning with a dessert reception at 6:30 p.m. in the Millerstown Community Park Building.

Emergency Services - When someone dials 911, they expect an emergency vehicle to arrive a short time later. But, there may be little thought given to the training and work that goes on behind the scene before that vehicle and personnel can show up. Volunteers must complete many hours of training to become certified emergency responders and much fundraising is needed to purchase equipment with the latest life-saving technology. Millerstown Fire Chief Chris Foose will discuss the fiscal workload and training requirements that goes into providing emergency services for the local area.

Community Citizen Award – Christina Voorhees will receive Perry Valley Grange's 2018 award in recognition of her services as coordinator of the Perry County Back Pack Program. This program helps meet the hunger needs of children by sending food home for the weekends when school resources are not available. It is facilitated through the Perry County and Central Pennsylvania Food Banks and is funded solely by grants and donations. The program to fight childhood hunger currently serves approximately 480 elementary students and is available in all six elementary schools in Perry County.



Mrs. Voorhees is passionate about community involvement and enjoys working with folks to help meet the needs of others. In addition to her work with the Back Pack program, Christina is actively involved at Church of the Living Christ in Loysville where she is a teacher for the children's

ministry, the director for Vacation Bible School, and serves on several committees.

Professionally, Christina is the Vice President of Wildlife Specialists, LLC, a natural resources consulting company based in northern PA. She was educated as a wildlife biologist and holds degrees from Virginia Tech and Penn State University. She currently lives outside of Landisburg with her husband and 2 children where they raise small animals and enjoy the outdoors.

The Community Citizen Award, given each year since 1978 by Perry Valley Grange, is part of a nationwide Grange initiative to recognize the outstanding volunteer service of individuals, couples and groups. Recipients were:

Major Service Projects

Our Grange is submitting a request again this year requesting the release of funds from the trust account held by the State Grange from the sale of our former property. Grange law allows that up to 10% of the remaining principle of real estate proceeds may be used annually for community service work. Our maximum withdrawal available this year will be approximately \$14,700.

The projects that have been proposed for the year include:

The 2018 project list will be finalized shortly and the funding request submitted to the State Grange. Any project costs in excess of the trust fund withdrawal will be paid from the current operating account balance.

The Hunger Banquet held on Feb 2nd at the Newport Family Life Center, sponsored jointly by the Grange and the Greenwood FFA, was a big success and will go a long way toward fighting hunger in this area. The \$3,585 proceeds, included in the 2/28 checking account balance shown to the right, will be given to the Perry County Food Bank in March.
